Letter from Editor

As practitioners and scholars, we are interested in widening our knowledge. This volume of JPCPY has examined a variety of issues of interest to our wide readership. The breadth and depth of the articles and reviews in this issue illustrate an international view of psychology and psychiatry in its complexity.

An experiential report of an immersive educational and training experience for undergraduate psychology students provides a phenomenological perspective on education and training. This manuscript, 'Vivence and meaning of psychology students in a spiritualist institution for institutionalized elderly in northeast Brazil: an experience report of knowledge in the light of phenomenology,' invites the reader into the experiences of undergraduate psychology students in an immersive experience.

The three narrative reviews in this issue are emotional mood disorders research: emotional behavior disorders research and emotional neglect research. Each review gives the reader a helpful perspective on these unique but related topics. 'The triune brain – linked by neuroeconomics and operated as socioeconomics' argues that SE is too complex for direct dissemination to the public but can be taught indirectly through public administration and economics educators. 'Sedated behind bars: the inappropriate use of psychiatry medication in Italy's incarcerated population' brings to mind the work of Thomas Szasz and R.D. Laing in the 1960. "Rapport, variation, repetition, mindful awareness and values: five pillars of successful psychiatry" provides a counterbalance to the article on imprisoned populations in Italy. In this opinion article, 'Taming wild passionate energies through love: uniting passion and compassion; living with integrity', argues that when "we unselfishly share with others the energy of love, or caring experiential connection, it functions like a relaxing, easeful, cohesive, unifying, force that calms our passionate energies and focuses them in constructive, productive, harmonious, directions".

In the 'Human suicide, molecular framework,' the authors point to the implication for the next generation of clinical suicide prediction,
